Academic Year 2019-2020 Brought Unique Challenges

This past academic year, like many have said, was unprecedented. Like many universities and colleges across the country, faculty and students at Tennessee Tech were forced to transition to fully online instruction at the end of March 2020 due to the pandemic. I applaud our faculty because they put in many extra hours of time, care and attention to help our French, German and Spanish students complete their courses for the semester.

The timing of this pivot also meant that our majors had to be advised remotely. Happily, our dedicated faculty advisors were able to complete this task in a timely manner while adjusting to all the teaching changes.

Many events scheduled for spring also had to be cancelled. For example, the department had to postpone its Tennessee World Affairs Council roundtable about the professional advantages that come with foreign language learning. In April 2019, Dr. Debbie Barnard, Associate Professor French, helped bring the roundtable to our Tennessee Tech campus for the first time in years, and it was unfortunate that we could not host the discussion again. However, we are happy to announce that the event has been rescheduled to take place virtually in October.

Another result of the pandemic was that we were unable to formally induct our strongest students into Tech's Eta Psi chapter of Alpha Mu Gamma, the national honor society for foreign language students. We nonetheless congratulate them on their accomplishments. Please see the back of this newsletter for their names and more details.

Although cancelling events was the right thing to do, I lament the necessity of doing so because activities like these help foster the kinds of connections that the university experience is all about.

Another effect of COVID-19 was that all study abroad

experiences were cancelled after March 2020, including Dr. Julia Gruber's scheduled GERM 4910 course trip to Berlin and Vienna. I spoke with several students who were crushed by the news that they could no longer travel to Japan, Italy, Spain, Korea and many other countries due to COVID travel restrictions. Hopefully, some study abroad opportunities will reopen in the not-toodistant future. Ultimately the virus will determine when it is safe to resume international study and in-person events.

While these times are very challenging, we look forward to returning to campus and resuming club meetings and special events. Once we are back together, let us remember to never take these opportunities for granted. Best wishes and good health!


We look forward to the contributions of both these new faculty members. Welcome to the department!
