Departmental Course Description

Required for International Business and Cultures majors with language concentration in Spanish. Course Requirements

A serious commitment to the study of Business Spanish is expected from each student. Students must promptly complete assignments **BEFORE** class. Punctuality and speaking Spanish in class are expected and required.

This is an advanced Spanish course and both the professor and the students will conduct themselves entirely in Spanish.

Methodology

The professor uses a variety of teaching techniques and formats to optimize the student's use of Business Spanish in class: discussions, simulations, paired and group activities, case study assignments, translation exercises, etc.

Exams

Each exam will cover all assigned material in two chapters of the textbook. The tentative exam schedule is as follows:

Participation

Each student is expected to participate <u>actively</u> in each class. Participation is evaluated on a daily basis and this grade, there are three (3), is given with each corrected exam. See explanation sheet on grading participation.

Assignments

This category includes homework assignments, pop quizzes, and any other graded exercises done in class or at home, excluding exams of course.

Mock Interview

Students will interview for a job in their anticipated field of business. They will indicate the type of job for which they are planning and will also submit their resume in Spanish on March 28th or March 30th. These interviews will be conducted one-on-one in Spanish with the professor in his office and will last between 10 and 15 minutes.

University Plagiarism Policy

"Plagiarism. When you use (for example, quote or even summarize or paraphrase) someone else's media, words, data, ideas, or other works, you must cite your source. Attendance is mandatory. The student is allowed three (3) absences, whether they are excused or unexcused. After the third absence, one point will be deducted from the student's final grade for each subsequent UNEXCUSED absence. Excessive tardiness will count as an unexcused absence.

ALL unexcused absences will count as a zero (0) for the day's participation grade.

An excused absence is one that occurs due to illness, injury, or death in the student's immediate family. The student must verify these circumstances with official letters as soon as they return to class. No excuses will be accepted one week after the circumstance occurred.

Please note: If you are participating in any university-sponsored event in which you must be absent from class, an official letter from a Tech faculty or staff member must list these dates and be presented to the professor at the beginning of the semester.
