STAYING CONNECTED TO YOUR ONLINE **STUDENTS**

After making a great first impression in your online or hybrid course, it is important to stay engaged. Students can begin to feel disconnected in an online environment, which can lead to a lack of motivation to login and complete assignments. Not only do students benefit from interaction with their classmates, but they also benefit from regular communication with their instructor. Touch base with your class on a regular and predictable basis. Additionally, remember that receiving timely responses from the instructor helps reduce students' anxiety, especially when they have questions or may be struggling. A recommended time frame for responding to emails is 24 to 48 hours. If you provide an expected response time in your course, be sure to observe it. Your students will appreciate it!
