Why use rubrics?



Benefits for students

- Understand expectations
- Self-evaluate
- "See it, want it, get it" K. Novak

Benefits for faculty

- · Clarify vague, fuzzy goals
- Grade items faster
- Note: search existing rubrics via <u>RubiStar</u>

Holistic Rubric

As a whole, how well did the assignment meet an overall criteria?



Analytic Rubric

For different criteria, how does the assignment rate?



Custom Points Rubric

What if different criteria need to be different point values?

Steps for Creating and Using Rubrics

Compose your criteria

Make sure the criteria directly link to course and module/unit learning objectives..



Write descriptions of the different point values

This can be the hardest part. Be sure to define vague words like "appropriate" or "enough"

Create & attach the rubric to the activity

This way students can see the rubric before submission..
