



PROGRAM MODIFICATIONS & ACTIVITIES

Three new faculty were brought into the counseling programs in AY22-23. These faculty modified some existing courses in the counseling programs by choosing different texts, assignments, and outlines for the class. None of the course descriptions or summative assignments were altered in the process. These courses included: Statistics, Advanced Statistics, Career Counseling, Counseling Skills, and Counseling Theories.

Three new courses were taught within the graduate counseling programs.

- 1. Advanced Couples Counseling was taught as a seminar in Summer 23.
- 2. Motivational Interviewing and Solution-Focused Counseling was taught as a seminar in Summer 23.
- 3. Advanced Research Design and Methodology (Ph.D. program) was taught in Spring 23 as a seminar.

All three courses are being considered as permanent classes within the graduate catalog.

Sponsored through CSI, faculty created a graduate cording and hooding ceremony. Two doctoral were corded for CSI honors. Six Masters' graduates were corded for CSI honors and also hooded as signifying their successful completion of the graduate program.
