At that meeting, I shared two four-letter words with the group that I want to revisit: *time* and *grit*. After nearly three decades in higher education, I have come to appreciate the importance of these two words.

Time is the one asset we all share, and the one we are constantly spending. Unlike money, time cannot be earned back once it is gone. It is a depreciating asset. Every day that passes is one less day we have remaining.

The important question, then, is not whether we are spending time. We all are. The question is whether we are investing it wisely.

In my experience, and consistent with much of what I have read, I have found *grit* to be an important characteristic of successful individuals. Grit is the determination to keep moving forward when things become difficult, to remain disciplined when the path is challenging, and to stay committed when the results are not clear.

As I mentioned during the university welcome a couple of weeks ago, everyone in that room understands the importance of discipline and knows how challenging it can be to push through difficult circumstances.

Likewise, I believe that same grit, that sheer determination to keep moving forward even when things are tough, lives within each of you, and today you are part of this amazing institution as a faculty member, a member of a very rare group of individuals when you look at the entire population.

I have seen evidence of it during my visits across campus. I have seen a tremendous commitment to our students, a willingness to work hard, and a genuine desire to make a difference. And perhaps just as importantly, I have seen a culture of kindness that makes those efforts even more meaningful.

As you begin this academic year, remember that time will continue to pass whether we are intentional about it or not. The difference between those who look back with great satisfaction and those who do not often comes down to the choices they make along the way, including what they prioritize, what they pursue, and what they are willing to work for. Over time, those choices define us.

I also mentioned during the new faculty meeting that everyone should “*chase yourself*.” What I mean by that is to set meaningful goals for yourself, goals that are one, two, or even three years out, and then develop the discipline and grit necessary to make them happen.

And while you are on that journey, I encourage you to bring a student along with you. Let them see what perseverance looks like. Make it a coachable moment. Our students are watching each of us for inspiration and encouragement, and, as I stated, some of them will view you as their superhero.
